1. (16pts) Find the following derivatives. Show your work below and circle your final answer.

(a) (4pts)
$$D_x(5x^2 - 4x + 2)$$

(b)
$$(4pts) D_x(\cos(x^5))$$

- $Sin(x^5)(5x^4) = -5x^4 sin(x^5)$

(c) (4pts) $D_x(\frac{x}{x+\sin x})$

$$Y = \frac{(x + \sin x)(1) - (x)(1 + \cos x)}{(x + \sin x)^{2}} = \frac{\sin x - x\cos x}{(x + \sin x)^{2}}$$

(d) $(4\text{pts}) D_{x}(x^{2}\sqrt{x+3}) = D_{x}(x^{2}(x+3)^{1/2})$
$$Y = 2x(x+3)^{1/2} + \frac{1}{2}x^{2}(x+3)^{-1/2} = 2x\sqrt{x+3} + \frac{x^{2}}{2\sqrt{x+3}}$$

2. (8pts) Compute the following limits. Answers may be values, $\pm \infty$, or 'DNE'. Show your work below and circle your final answer.

(a) (4pts)
$$\lim_{x \to 1} \frac{x^2 - x}{x^2 - 1} = \lim_{X \to 1} \frac{x(x - 1)}{(x - 1)(x + 1)} = \lim_{X \to 1} \frac{x}{x + 1} = \begin{pmatrix} 1 \\ 2 \end{pmatrix}$$

(b)
$$(4\text{pts}) \lim_{x \to 0^+} \frac{1}{x^2 - x} = \lim_{X \to 0^+} \frac{1}{X(X-1)}$$

Note that when $x \approx 0$ and $x > 0$, $X(X-1) < 0$, so expression is
regathe. So $\lim_{X \to 0^+} \frac{1}{X^2 - X} = -\infty$
 $x \to 0^+ X^2 - X = -\infty$

3. (6pts) Find the equation of the tangent line to the graph of $f(x) = x^3 - 2x$ at the point (2, 4).

$$f(x) = x^{3} - 2x \implies f(z) = 4.$$

$$f'(x) = 3x^{2} - 2 \implies f'(z) = 10.$$
Equ of fargent live at x = a:

$$y = f(a) + f'(a)(x-a)$$
So when $a = 2$

$$y = 4 + 10(x-2) = 10x - 16.$$

4. (6pts) A spherical balloon is being inflated. If air is being pumped in at a rate of 18π in³/s, how fast is the radius of the balloon increasing when the radius is equal to 3 inches? Remember the volume of a sphere is $V = \frac{4}{3}\pi r^3$.

$$V = \frac{4}{3}\pi r^{3}$$

$$\frac{dV}{dt} = 4\pi r^{2} \frac{dn}{dt}$$

$$S_{0} = \frac{1}{8\pi} \frac{1}{(3)^{2}} \frac{dr}{dt}$$

$$\frac{dV}{dt} = \frac{1}{8\pi} \frac{1}{(3)^{2}} \frac{dr}{dt}$$

5. (10pts) Use the **definition of the derivative** to compute the derivative of the function $f(x) = x^2 - 2x + 3$; that is, compute the limit

$$f'(x) = \lim_{h \to 0} \frac{f(x+h) - f(x)}{h}$$

$$f'(x) = \lim_{h \to 0} \frac{f(x+h) - f(x)}{h}$$

$$= \lim_{h \to 0} \frac{(x+h)^2 - 2(x+h) + 3 - (x^2 - 2x + 3)}{h}$$

$$= \lim_{h \to 0} \frac{x^2 + 2xh + h^2 - 2x - 2h + 3 - x^2 + 2x - 3}{h}$$

$$\underset{h \to 0}{\text{MUSSUUTS}} = \lim_{h \to 0} \frac{2 xh + h^2 - 2h}{h}$$

$$= \lim_{h \to 0} 2x + h - 2 = 2x - 2$$

6. (18pts) Consider the function

$$f(x) = x^4 - \frac{8}{3}x^3 + 2x^2 + 1$$

(a) (3pts) Find f'(x).

$$f'(x) = 4x^3 - 8x^2 + 4x$$

(b) (3pts) Find the critical point(s) of f.

$$\mathcal{G} = f'(x) = 4x^{3} - 8x^{2} + 4x = 4x(x^{2} - 2x + 1) = 4x(x - 1)^{2}$$

$$\mathcal{G} = f'(x) = 4x^{3} - 8x^{2} + 4x = 4x(x^{2} - 2x + 1) = 4x(x - 1)^{2}$$

 \mathcal{V} (c) (2pts) Fill in the blanks: f(x) is decreasing on the interval ($-\infty$, $-\infty$). Note: $\pm\infty$ are acceptable answers.

(d) (2pts) Which critical point is a local minimum?

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(e) (3pts) Find f''(x).

$$\mathcal{F}''(x) = |2x^2 - 16x + 4 = 4(3x^2 - 4x + 1) = 4(3x - 1)(x - 1)$$

(g) (2pts) Fill in the blanks: f(x) is concave down on the interval (23, 1). Note: $\pm \infty$ are acceptable answers.

7. (6pts) Evaluate the Riemann sum for $f(x) = \frac{2x}{1+x^2}$ on the interval [-1, 5] using the partition of 3 subintervals of equal length with the sample points being the left-endpoints of each subinterval.

8. (9pts) Evaluate the following expressions related the the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus.
3. (a) (3pts) If
$$F(t)$$
 is an antiderivative of $f(t) = t^3 \sin t$, then $F'(t) = \frac{t^3 5 \ln t}{2}$
(b) (3pts) $\frac{d}{dx} \int_1^x (t^3 \sin t) dt$
3. $= \frac{d}{dX} \left(F(x) - F(1) \right) = F'(x) = \frac{x^3 \sin x}{x^2}$
(c) (3pts) $\frac{d}{dx} \int_{x^2}^x (t^3 \sin t) dt$
3. $= \frac{d}{dX} \left(F(x) - F(x^2) \right) = F'(x) - F'(x^2)(2x)$
 $= \frac{x^3 \sin x}{x^2 - (x^6 \sin (x^2))(2x)} = \frac{x^3 \sin x - 2x^7 \sin (x^2)}{x^3 \sin x - 2x^7 \sin (x^2)}$
9. (10pts) Find the following indefinite integrals. Remember $+C!$
(a) (5pts) $\int (4x^3 - x^2 + 7x + 5) dx$
 $= \frac{x^4 - \frac{1}{3}x^3 + \frac{7}{2}x^2 + 5x + C$

(b)
$$(5pts) \int x \sin(x^2) dx$$

 $u = \chi^2 \implies du = 2\chi d\chi$
 $= \frac{1}{2} \int \sin u \, du = -\frac{1}{2} \cos u + C = -\frac{1}{2} \cos(\chi^2) + C$

10. (8pts) Use symmetry of the integrand to find the following definite integrals:

$$\frac{1}{\pi/2} = \frac{1}{2} \int_{0}^{\pi} |\sin(2x)| dx = 2 \int_{0}^{\pi/2} \sin(2x) dx$$

$$= 2 \left(\frac{-1}{2} \cos(2x) \right)_{0}^{\pi/2} = - \left[\cos(\pi) - \cos(0) \right] = 2$$

$$\frac{1}{\pi/2} = \frac{\pi}{1} \int_{-1}^{1} \frac{x^{3}}{1+x^{2}} dx$$

$$f(x) = \frac{x^{3}}{1+x^{2}} \text{ is odd , since } f(-x) = \frac{(-x)^{3}}{1+(-x)^{2}} = -\frac{x^{3}}{1+x^{2}} = -f(x).$$
Since $[-1, 1]$ is symmetric about $x = 0$,
$$4 = \int_{-1}^{1} \frac{x^{3}}{1+x^{2}} dx = 0.$$

- 11. (26pts) Consider the region R in the first quadrant bounded by y = x and $y = 3x x^2$. Figure A below is a rough sketch of the region R.
 - (a) (5pts) Find the coordinates (x, y) of the point of intersection of the curves y = x and $y = 3x x^2$ labeled P in the sketch below.

$$X = 3x - x^2 \implies 0 = 2x - x^2 = x(2-x)$$

 $X = 0, 2.$
when $x = 2, y = x = 2.$ So $P = (2, 2)$

(b) (5pts) Find the area of the region R.

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$$A = \int_{0}^{2} (3x - x^{2} - x) dx = \int_{0}^{2} (2x - x^{2}) dx = \left(x^{2} - \frac{1}{3}x^{3}\right)^{2}$$
$$= 4 - \frac{8}{3} = \frac{4}{3}$$

(c) (8pts) Find the volume of the solid obtained by rotating the region R around the x-axis.

$$V = \int_{0}^{2} \pi \left[(3x - x^{2})^{2} - x^{2} \right] dx = \pi \int_{0}^{2} (9x^{2} - bx^{3} + x^{4} - x^{2}) dx$$

= $\pi \int_{0}^{2} (8x^{2} - bx^{3} + x^{4}) dx = \pi \left(\frac{8}{3} \times \frac{3}{2} - \frac{3}{2} \times \frac{4}{5} + \frac{x^{5}}{5} \right)_{0}^{2}$
= $\pi \left(\frac{64}{3} - \frac{48}{2} + \frac{32}{5} \right) = \frac{56\pi}{15}$

(d) (8pts) Find the volume of the solid obtained by rotating the region R around the y-axis.

$$V = \int_{0}^{2} 2\pi \chi (2\chi - \chi^{2}) d\chi = 2\pi \int_{0}^{2} (2\chi^{2} - \chi^{3}) d\chi$$
$$= 2\pi \left(\frac{2}{3} \chi^{3} - \frac{\chi^{4}}{4} \right)_{0}^{2}$$
$$= 2\pi \left(\frac{2}{3} \chi^{3} - \frac{\chi^{4}}{4} \right)_{0}^{2}$$
$$= 2\pi \left(\frac{16}{3} - \frac{16}{4} \right) = \left(\frac{5\pi}{3} \right)$$

12. (8pts) Find the arc length of the curve defined by the parametric equations

13. (9pts) A 2 meter-long rod is placed on the x-axis with one end at x = 0 and the other end at x = 2. Suppose in this position the density of the rod is given by $\rho(x) = 3x^2 \text{ kg/m}$. Find the total mass of the rod, the moment of the rod with respect to the origin, and the location of the center of mass of the rod.

3 Total mass,
$$m = \int_{0}^{2} \rho(x) dx = \int_{0}^{2} 3x^{2} dx = (x^{3} \int_{0}^{2} \in \frac{8 \text{ kg}}{9})$$

3 Moment, $M = \int_{0}^{2} x \rho(x) dx = \int_{0}^{2} 3x^{3} dx = (\frac{3}{4}x^{4} \int_{0}^{2} = \frac{12 \text{ kg}}{9} m)$
3 Center of mass, $\overline{x} = \frac{M}{m} = \frac{12}{8} \in 1.5 \text{ m}$

14. (10pts) A rectangular tank is filled with an oil which has a density of 80 lbs/ft³. The tank is 10 feet tall, 6 feet long, and 2 feet wide. Use an integral to determine much work is required to pump the oil out over the top edge of the tank? Give your answer in foot-pounds.

$$W = \int_{0}^{6\pi} \frac{1}{2} \left[\frac{1}{2} \right]_{0}^{10}$$

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
